Saltonstall to Tour Military Installations
WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (UP)—Sen. Leverett Saltonstall (R-Mass.) will tour military installations in Europe and the Eastern Mediterranean area next month. It was reported today.

The armed services committee chairman's itinerary is not complete but will be announced later this week. Rep. Joseph W. Martin, Jr. (R-Mass.) the house speaker, currently is visiting Europe.

Construction Worker Killed In Burlington

R. I. Man Crushed Between Two Trucks On Route 3 Project

BURLINGTON—A 26-year-old construction worker met instant death shortly after 8 o'clock this morning when he was crushed between two trucks while working on the new overpass on Route 3 in Burlington.

According to police, Earl V. Atalato, an employee of the Companel and Carby Construction company which is doing the construction work, was attempting to unhitch two trucks when one of them rolled back and pinned him against the other.

The victim suffered a broken neck, crushed chest and multiple internal injuries. Death was pronounced "instant" by Dr. Anthony Giamagrosio of Burlington.

The victim, married and the father of a child, made his home on Central avenue, in Johnston, R. I.

Police Chief Malcolm MacEachern and Officer Edward McCarthy investigated.

The body was removed to a funeral home in Woburn.

Rhee Pilot Delivers Plane To Commies

South Korean Flies U. S. Mustang to North Korea

PANMUNJOM, Oct. 20 (INS)—Communist sources in Panmunjom reported today that a Republic of Korea Air Force pilot flew his American-built F-51 Mustang fighter into North Korea yesterday.

Upon landing at a North Korean airfield, the Red sources claimed, the South Korean flier asked for political asylum.

Neither the ROK defense ministry nor the U. S. Fifth Air Force would comment on the Communist report.

It was the first time since the armistice went into effect last July that the Reds have claimed the defection of an Allied flier to the Communist side.

On Sept. 19, a North Korean air force lieutenant escaped from Communism by flying his Russian-made MIG-15 jet fighter to Kimpo airfield, near Seoul. He was granted political asylum and received a \$100,000 reward for delivering an intact MIG to the Allies.

25 Women Members of Armed Forces Face Discharge, Washington Paper Says

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The Times-Herald reported today that Army investigators have "broken up a ring" of approximately 25 women members of the armed forces who, the investigators charged, engaged in immoral sex practices.

It said the crackdown stemmed from charges made last month by a 19-year-old WAC private, who is currently under treatment at a local Army hospital.

The Top 10

Supt. Sayers had sent in a requisition for seven sergeants. Presumably, the first seven of the above top 10 would receive the appointments.

Question of Law
However, it is questionable if more than three new sergeants, if that many, can be named at this time. Under the law, a new position created during a municipal election year shall not be valid unless in operation for more than three months during that year. In order to comply with the law any new positions would have to have been created and operative prior to Oct. 1 of this year.

At the present, there are two vacancies in the rank of sergeant, resulting from the promotion of Sgt. Richard A. Cullen to lieutenant, and the retirement of Sgt. Frank H. Murphy. If seven sergeants were to be appointed, it would mean the creation of five new positions.

Some months ago, a patrolman's job in the department was eliminated, and a sergeant's job was set up to replace it. However, whether this will permit the appointment of another sergeant at this time is questionable.

Following the retirement of Capt. William F. Murphy, money was set up to provide for three new sergeants instead of the appointment of a new captain. This cannot be done at this late date under the law, however.

Wide Shakeup Looms
In the event Supt. Sayers is authorized to make seven appointments, a widespread shakeup of the department will follow.

The superintendent has been planning such a shakeup for some time, but has been waiting for the opportunity to appoint some new sergeants before making the shakeup.

Silver Star Medal Given Hero's Mother

Marine Pvt. Melvin P. Gamache Honored by Posthumous Award

LOWELL—At impressive ceremonies yesterday in the city council chamber in city hall, Mrs. Hazel Bege, mother of Pvt. Melvin P. Gamache, who lost his life in Korea, was awarded his Silver Star medal by Lieut. Col. Reginald Ward, representing the director of the First Marine Corps district.

The ceremonies were attended by Mayor Henry Beaudry, Adm. J. Frederick Way, civil defense director; Henry F. Mullen, of the Marine Corps League; Manuel Bettencourt, representing the American Legion; and a delegation representing the Gold Star Mothers.

In attendance also were Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Shaugnessy, grandparents of the heroic marine.

The citation from the president of the United States, read by Lt. Col. Ward before he pinned the medal on Mrs. Bege, was as follows:

"The president of the United States takes pride in presenting the Silver Star Medal posthumously to Private Melvin P. Gamache, United States Marine Corps, for service as set forth in the following citation:

"For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity while serving as an assistant automatic rifleman of Company B, First Battalion, Seventh Marines, First Marine Division (Reinforced), in action against enemy aggressor forces in Korea on 23 February, 1953.

"When his platoon was subjected to a deadly hail of automatic weapons fire from numerically superior enemy forces while setting up a perimeter defense around a group of tanks well forward of the main line of resistance, Private Gamache bravely exposed himself to the hostile barrage and delivered effective counter fire, greatly aiding in repulsing the enemy attack.

"Although his squad's position was again attacked and partially overrun, he fearlessly continued to fire his weapons and hurl hand grenades and, as the hostile troops approached within a few yards of either flank, Private Gamache dauntlessly fixed his bayonet and faced the advancing enemy at point-blank range until he fell, mortally wounded.

"By his outstanding courage, aggressive leadership and self-sacrifice, he inspired his fellow Marines to fight with renewed determination and valor.

"His heroic actions and sacrifice have brought honor and credit to himself, his family, his unit, and the United States Marine Corps.

"His death was a great loss to the United States Marine Corps and the United States of America.

Report U. S. to Slow Down Evacuation of Its Troops From Disputed Trieste

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The United States and Britain reportedly have decided to slow down evacuation of their troops from disputed Trieste while they try to resolve Italy's and Yugoslav's bitter quarrel over the area.

UN Council Braces for Big Debates on Trieste, Israel

Yugoslavia Warns She Will Not Accept Italian Zone A Occupation of Disputed Area

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Oct. 20.—The UN security council braced itself for a double-header today—Soviet demands for the internationalization of disputed Trieste and continued debate on a Big Three call for a probe into the bloody Arab-Israeli border squabble.

The Arab-Israeli question was first on the twin bill with the 11-nation group meeting to decide how the item shall be listed on the agenda. U. S. delegates reportedly huddled with the council's sole Arab state representative, Lebanon's Charles Malik, to seek a phrasing acceptable to all.

Big Three Demand
The United States, Britain and France asked for an urgent council session on the Palestine issue after denouncing an Israeli attack on a Jordan village last week in which Jordan claims 66 lives were lost.

The council yesterday approved a U. S. suggestion that it request Maj. Gen. Vagn Bennike of Denmark, chief of staff of the UN truce supervision organization in Palestine, to fly here and report fully to the council. He is not expected to arrive until late in the week.

Later today the council was scheduled to continue debate on the Soviet-sponsored move to name a Swiss governor for the free territory of Trieste under permanent UN control.

Both Yugoslavia and Italy oppose the solution for the future of the strategic area, which each claims. Yugoslav Foreign Secretary Koca Popovic asked the council last night for permission to be heard when the question comes up. If tradition is followed, this permission will be granted, although Yugoslavia is not a member of the council.

No Hearing Request
Italy did not immediately request a hearing. Although not a member of the UN, the Rome government keeps a permanent observer at the international organization's headquarters.

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Yugoslav Charge
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He said the attack was made by Israeli border settlers whose patience was "exhausted after a mother and her two children were killed in their sleep in Yahud village.

Found With Tools, Also Charged With Break at Diner

LOWELL—Thomas E. Rourke, 21, of Page road, Litchfield, N. H., was held in \$5000 bail this morning in district court and his case was continued until tomorrow following charges resulting from a wild "joy ride" in a stolen bakery truck early this morning. Police say he is a AWOL soldier.

According to police, Charles J. McCarthy, 8 Ravena terrace, Lynn, driver of the truck belonging to the Cushman Brothers Bakery Co., was having coffee shortly after 4:30 o'clock this morning at Rochette's diner on Merrimack street, when a man tapped him on the shoulder and told him his semi-trailer truck was being stolen from outside the diner.

Looking out the window the two men saw the truck moving away in the direction of Kearney square.

Gave Chase
McCarthy, summoning the aid of Joseph E. Goudreau, 40 Nashua road, Dracut, who was in the diner at the time, gave chase to his truck, in the Goudreau automobile.

Rourke abandoned the stolen trailer-truck near the Central bridge on Bridge street and fled from the scene through the alley at the Stop and Shop.

McCarthy and Goudreau followed the man and police joined in the chase until Rourke was captured on Davidsor street.

When he was captured, the police found a flash light, pliers, a screw driver and cigarettes on Rourke's person.

Police said that Rourke told them he got these items from a parked car earlier in the night. The owner of the burglarized car, Peter Marcotte, 509 Moody street, said that his car which was parked on Moody street, did not contain any of these articles.

Police also charged Rourke with the burglary of a diner on Middlesex street operated by Peter Elipoulos which they claim was broken into some time before the trailer-truck was stolen.

Rourke denied this break.

He faces charges of unlawful use of a motor vehicle and larceny of five packages of cigarettes, to which charges he pleaded guilty this morning in district court.

He pleaded not guilty to the burglary charges in connection with the Elipoulos diner.

Joining in the chase and eventual capture of the New Hampshire man were Officers Edward Davis, Joseph Riley, Arthur Liakos and Emory Ouellette. Aiding in the investigation was Sgt. Edward F. Murphy.

Labor Leader Hutcheson Dead at 79

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 20 (AP)—William L. Hutcheson, 79, general president of the AFL Carpenters union for 36 years and a towering figure in the American labor movement, died in Methodist hospital here today of a heart ailment.

The veteran labor leader was brought to the hospital Oct. 12 for a stomach examination and suffered a heart attack Oct. 15 before the stomach tests were completed. He had been in critical condition since.

Hutcheson, one of the few Republicans among top union officials, stepped down from the active presidency of the 822,000-member union Jan. 1, 1952, and was succeeded by his son, Maurice A. Hutcheson. The elder Hutcheson was named general president emeritus.
