Commission Aims Health Warning On Cigarettes
WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Trade Commission opens hearings today on its proposal to tag every pack of cigarettes with a health warning.

FTC Chairman Paul Dixon is the leadoff witness, to be followed over three days by representatives of the tobacco industry and tobacco workers, governors of tobacco-growing states, physicians and public health officials.

In the wake of the surgeon general's report Jan. 11 that cigarette smoking is a hazard to health, the commission proposed that every cigarette advertisement and every cigarette package carry this warning: "Caution: Cigarette smoking is dangerous to health. It may cause death from cancer and other diseases."

Court Balances the Books By Giving Press Freedom

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court balanced the books a bit this week when it gave newspapers more freedom than at any time in history in criticizing government officials' official conduct.

The court, in doing so, was catching up with a principle laid down 56 years ago by a judge in Kansas.

The nine justices, in their unanimous opinion, didn't give newspapers an absolute immunity against libel suits for damages criticized officials. But they came close.

Allows For Error
A citizen or newspaper won't have to prove the total truth of a criticism. The court made allowance for error in fact or opinion, even though an official is defamed.

Now a newspaper doesn't have to fear a damage suit unless the criticism can be proved to have come from actual malice.

But public officials—thanks to an earlier Supreme Court decision—already had that much immunity against damages suits when they acted officially.

Justice William J. Brennan, who wrote this latest opinion, argued critics of government should have the greatest freedom possible except for provable malice, he said.

He recalled that earlier opinion of the Supreme Court which said the statements of a federal official are "absolutely privileged if made within the outer perimeter of his duties." Brennan added:

India Trying To Buy Planes

Buying was brisk in cigarette stocks in the wake of an additional published report that cigarette sales were recovering following their initial sharp decline on the government report about smoking and health.

News Briefs

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—An additional 223 Canadian troops were due in Cyprus today for the U.N. peace force. The island itself was unusually quiet. Although tension remained high, a lull in the fighting between Greek and Turkish Cypriots continued into the sixth day. Arrival of the Canadian troops was considered to have had a calming effect.

Canadian officials hope to have the entire Canadian contingent of 1,150 men in Cyprus by March 24. An advance party of 106 officers and men came in three planes over the weekend.

NEW YORK (AP)—The National Football League today reinstated Paul Hornung and Alex Karras, professional football stars suspended indefinitely last April 17 for gambling activities. The reinstatement goes into effect immediately.

Hornung, a member of the Green Bay Packers and three-time scoring champion of the National Football League, and Karras, an outstanding defensive tackle with the Detroit Lions, were set down for betting on football games.

At the same time, five other maximum of \$2,000 each for Detroit players were fined the betting on one game and the Detroit club was fined \$4,000 for laxness in reporting information to the commissioner and in supervising its bench at games.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson says he'll do everything he can to win passage of the civil rights bill and predicts the Senate will approve it "in due time" in its present form.

The Senate has a duty to pass the measure as approved by the House, he told the nation in an interview broadcast and televised Sunday night. "I know of nothing more important for this Congress to do" than to pass the measure, he said.

With this prodding from the White House, the Senate starts a second week of debate today on a motion to take up the bill.

SAIGON, Viet Nam (AP)—Six more American airmen were killed in South Viet Nam during the weekend as Red guerrillas shot down a U.S. helicopter and a spotter plane. Four of the airmen were aboard the helicopter, which was hit by ground fire Sunday 100 miles south of Saigon.

The other two airmen were aboard an L19 spotter plane that was knocked down Saturday northeast of Saigon. The six deaths brought to 124 the number of Americans killed in action in the Viet Nam war since the U.S. buildup in Viet Nam began in December 1961.

MOSCOW (AP)—Lithuania's Supreme Court has sentenced seven Lithuanians to prison terms for allegedly joining with Nazi bands in killing thousands of persons during the country's World War II occupation.

Two were tried in absentia, including a Roman Catholic priest, the Rev. Lenginas Januskis of Brooklyn, New York City, the Soviet news agency Tass reported yesterday.

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A million Mexicans were expected to turn out today in an enthusiastic welcome for President Charles de Gaulle as he begins a campaign to increase French influence in Latin America.

De Gaulle was to arrive in the Mexican capital in a French Air Force jet early in the afternoon after a quick change of planes at the Yucatan peninsula city of Merida, 835 miles east of Mexico City.

Latin-American Communists are reported exploiting the visit by stressing De Gaulle's differences with the United States, particularly his pursuit of an independent foreign policy.

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Small Electronics Firm Invents Device To Revolutionize TV System of Ratings

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Discovery of a new way of counting how many sets are turned to what television shows could revolutionize the controversial program-rating industry.

Its inventors say the system, which involves trucks with revolving circular antennas that pick up signals from each home set, will make obsolete rating methods using telephone interviews, diaries kept by selected viewers and recorders attached to sets.

Small Company
James L. Tanner, who with his brother, Thomas, and his father, Charles operates a small electronics company in suburban Wilmington, says negotiations are under way to sell the survey system to a program rating company.

Current rating systems, frequently the deciding factor in whether a show stays on the air, have been criticized because they are based on sampling from a few hundred so-called representative homes.
