Would Have B&M Included In Norfolk & Western

WASHINGTON — The Boston and Maine Railroad, threatened with extinction by the imminent merger of the giant Pennsylvania and New York Central Railroads, received a potential reprieve today from the Interstate Commerce Commission.

ICC Commissioner Charles A. Webb recommended that three eastern railroads, including the B & M, become part of the Norfolk and Western System. The other two are the Erie Lackawanna and the Delaware and Hudson. Webb said the latter two should be authorized and directed for inclusion, while the B & M should be authorized but not directed.

This means that if the report is accepted as it stands, the N & W will have to include the Erie Lackawanna and the Delaware and Hudson in its system, but could refuse to take the B & M. A spokesman for the ICC told The Sun he didn't think the N & W wanted any of the three, in view of the poor financial condition of each.

If, however, the B & M were refused, it could then apply to the commission for inclusion in the Penn. Central system, and the spokesman said it would be a "good guess" that ICC would approve such a petition and direct the Penn. Central to take over the New England road.

This is especially true since the ICC is known to feel that all three should continue operation.

"The transportation services of all three petitioners are essential," Webb said, "and they cannot survive as independent carriers after the Penn. Central merger is finally consummated."

He found that inclusion of the trio in the N & W would be consistent with the public interest, though each railroad would lose traffic to the Penn. Central. Webb felt the resulting loss of revenue would not be so large as to prevent them, if included, from providing adequate transportation service.

THE THREE roads had filed for inclusion under terms of the ICC approval of the merger of the N & W and the Nickel Plate and Wabash Railroad. Acceptance of the report and of inclusion will be contingent on the consummation of the pending Penn-Central merger.

"As subsidiaries of the N & W," Webb stated, "the net reduction in gross freight revenues and the consequence of the Penn-Central merger would be about \$7,000,000 for the Erie Lackawanna, \$1.3 million for the Delaware and Hudson, and \$362,000 for the B & M." The losses would presumably be far greater if the three were not included.

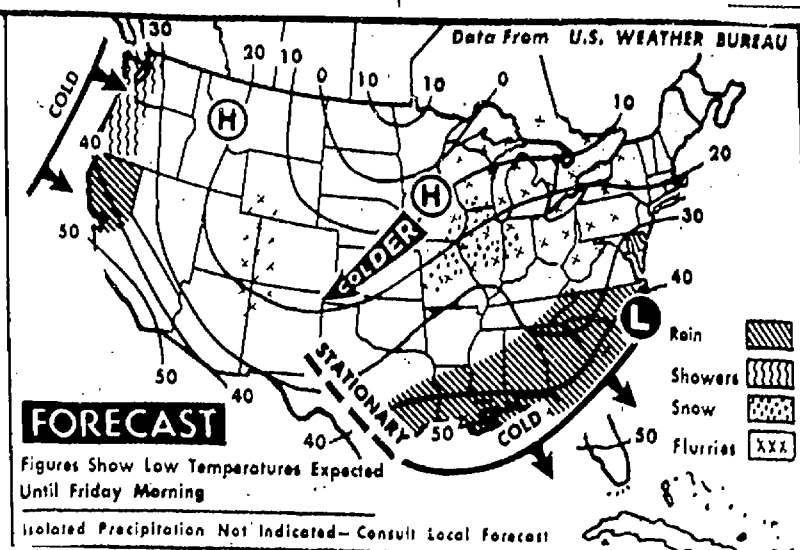
The ICC spokesman said there will be thirty days for the parties involved to file objections. This applies primarily to the N & W. There will be twenty days after that for the filing of replies to objections. Then the full ICC will take one or two days to hear "all arguments" and will make its final report.

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Man Must Seek Peace Through God, Says Pontiff

VATICAN CITY (Reuters) — Pope Paul VI tonight appealed to both sides in the Vietnam war to extend the forthcoming truce and get peace negotiations going.

In his Christmas message to the world, broadcast over Vatican radio, he said he wished to express his satisfaction and praise that both sides had arranged a brief truce over Christmas.

"Now one waits in hope that both sides may extend the truce and that from the suspension of hostilities it may be possible to advance to negotiations in good faith, the only way of reaching peace in freedom and justice," he said.

He went on "goodwill holds the key to peace. The difficulty is that the responsible authorities of the two sides must make use of this key at the same time."

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"That they should do so with sincere and concrete actions should be the wondrous event of this Christmas," he said.

THE POPE said he would like to think that this miracle of goodwill was still possible. "So respectfully and fervently we appeal to both contending parties and to all who lend support to either side," he said.

The Pope described the Vietnam war as "typical, tragic and threatening; for it is at once an ideological, civil and military war; the balance between the peoples involved turns on it; in it surprise tactics, the means of warfare used and the damage inflicted are steadily on the increase; and it is of supreme importance to the larger nations."

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
