The couple will be at home after July 1 at 106 East 81st Street, New York City.

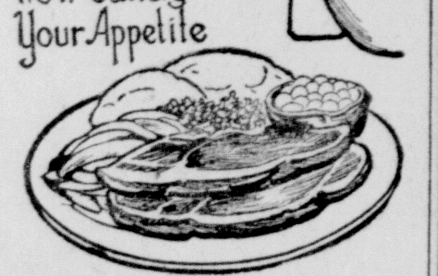

PITTSFIELD BOY REPRESENTS STATE AT ANNUAL 4-H CAMP

AMHERST, June 18.—Four outstanding Massachusetts 4-H Club members, Elizabeth K. Parsons of North Amherst, Eleanor A. Bentley of West Upton, Everett Skinner of Plainville and John Bartels of Pittsfield, are attending the 11th national 4-H Club camp which opened yesterday at Washington, D. C.

The four young people, chosen because of their outstanding 4-H Club records, personality, character, and leadership ability, represent this State in the activities of the National Camp, which is attended each year by 4-H Club members from nearly every State in the country. The camp will be in session until June 23.

John Bartels, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Bartels, 908 Elm Street, is 19 years old, and has been a 4-H Club member for five years, specializing in the potato, poultry and dairy products. He was graduated from Pittsfield High School and will enter Massachusetts State College in the fall.

Bartels first started 4-H Club work in 1933 with 90 laying hens and a sideline of potato growing. The next year he added a dairy project to his 4-H activities and collected prizes on his Avyshire calf at the Eastern States Exposition in Springfield and at the Great Barrington Fair. That same year he was a member of the Berkshire County dairy demonstration team which won first prize at Massachusetts State College, and he won a week's trip to State Camp at Amherst.

The next two years, Bartels carried on dairy, poultry, and potato projects and last year won third prize in the State College dairy-judging contest and was a member of the Massachusetts 4-H dairy-judging team which placed third at Eastern States Exposition. In the same contest he won third prize in individual judging. At the Great Barrington Fair, he carried off a first prize in dairy judging and third prize in poultry judging. He also added leadership of a poultry club to his activities.
