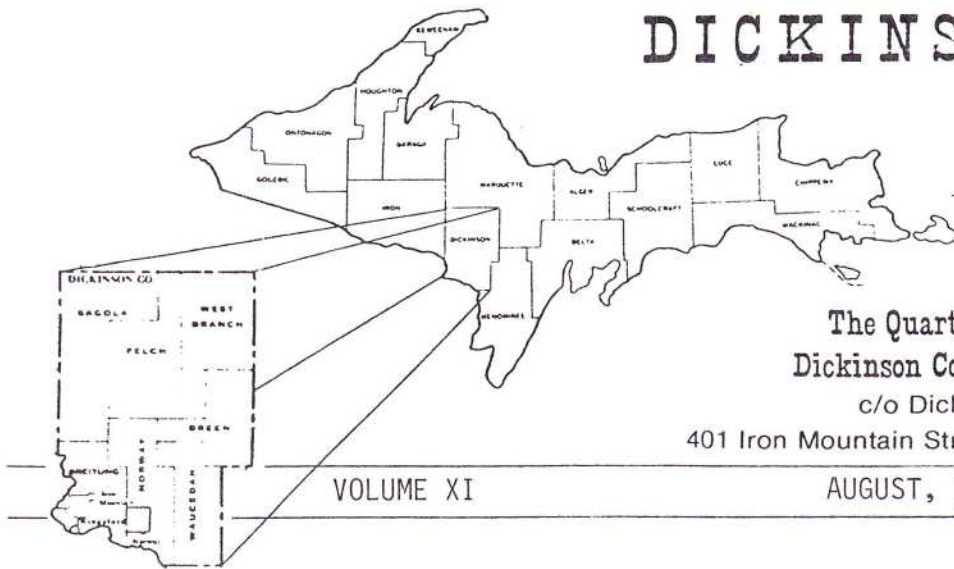

55/PIONEER PORTRAITS [History of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, 1883]

Treasurer ever since 1857. In politics, Mr. White has always been a Democrat, but with a strong leaning to conservative principles and practice in politics. He has been one of the officers of St. Paul's (Episcopal) Church in Marquette during nearly the entire period since the formation of the parish in 1855, and has been a very large contributor to the building of its handsome church. Mr. White organized and started the First National Bank of Marquette in 1862, and has ever since been its managing or presiding officer. He has also done the principal part of the insurance business of Marquette for the past twenty-five years, and has been and now is a director in several of the leading iron ore companies of the county. In short, there is no enterprise of a general or public character in Marquette County with which he is not more or less intimately associated. He is always ready to aid all deserving objects or persons, with counsel, with time (notwithstanding he is a very busy man) and with money. So much energy, liberality and public spirit are rarely combined, and Mr. White holds deservedly a high place in the regard of his fellow-citizens, as well as among his numerous friends and acquaintances in all parts of the country. He was married, in 1857, to Ellen S., the eldest daughter of Dr. M.L. Hewitt. His present family consists of his wife and two daughters, the eldest of whom married Mr. A.O. Jopling in 1881. JUDGE WILLIAM D. WILLIAMS is a native of Michigan, and was born in Washtenaw March 22, 1834; he received his education in this State, and graduated in the literary course at the State University in 1857; studied law in Detroit, and was admitted to the bar in 1859. After his admission, he came to Lake Superior as attorney for the mining companies, and located at Ontonagon and engaged in the practice of law, remaining there until 1874. In 1874, came to Marquette, and continued the practice of his profession. In 1875, he was elected Judge, being nominated by both parties, and went on the bench in January, 1876; since that time, the circuit has been divided, and he is now Judge of the copper district. He was elected Prosecuting Attorney at Ontonagon in 1868; the following year, was elected Representative of the State Legislature. He has long been a prominent member of the bar of this State, and in his practice has largely represented corporations and mining companies. In 1861, Judge Williams was united in marriage to Miss Sarah C. Cardell, from the city of Detroit. They have three children -- William W., Robert C. and Edward H. He is a large holder of real estate in the copper and iron districts. [Page 436; portrait on page 435]

IRON MOUNTAIN.

Rys., in Dickinson county, of which it is the seat of justice, 72 miles, by rail, northwest of Menominee, and 208 from Milwaukee. It is lighted by electricity, has water works, fire department, and excellent sewerage. There are churches of the Baptist, three Catholic, Episcopal, Methodist Episcopal, Presbyterian, Swedish Mission, Swedish Methodist, Swedish Baptist and Swedish Lutheran denominations, 7 handsome and roomy school buildings (3 costing over \$15,000 each and 1 erected at a cost of \$50,000), a library costing \$20,000, with 4,800 volumes, a finely appointed opera house, with a seating capacity of 1,000, 2 banks, an \$85,000 county building, first-class hotels and other minor advantages. Two daily newspapers, Daily Tribune and Evening Gazette, and 2 weeklies, Range Tribune and Press, are published. This is the location of the famous Chapin Iron Mine, the largest and best in the Upper Peninsula, producing a very rich hematite ore, from which is made the best Bessemer iron and steel. The mine employs about 1,000 men and is worked at a depth of 1,000 feet. The plant is of the most modern description, and immense hydraulic machinery, costing \$300,000, has been constructed to convey compressed air into the mine. There are other iron mines surrounding the city and are the principal industries of the place. Telephone connec-

The saw-mill was shut down last Tuesday to allow the employes to attend the circus at Iron Mountain.

Miss Josie and Master Elmer O'Callaghan visited at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. John Dawson at Crystal Falls last Sunday.

The Board of Education has employed Miss Mary McCole as teacher at Sagola and Miss Lizzie Reynolds at Channing for the ensuing school year.

W.W. Thompson, manager of the Commercial Bank Insurance agency, of Iron Mountain, was in town last Monday writing some insurance for the Sagola Lumber company.

The date for receiving bids for building the new school-house at Channing has been extended to August 20th. The plans and specifications are now in the hands of the township clerk at Sagola.

Mr. and Mrs. John Crane, James Crane and Richard E. Crane went to Marinette last Tuesday to attend the funeral of Mrs. Daniel McFarley, a sister of John and James Crane, who was buried there yesterday.

Dr. M.F. Dockery has a fine three-year-old colt, which John Shannon is breaking to drive. The colt is of good stock and gives evidence of developing into a fast driver. It has already made a record of less than three minutes.

It is rumored that John Shannon has about decided to become a candidate for sheriff of Dickinson county. Mr. Shannon is a determined man and a favorite among his associates, and would in all probability receive a liberal support for the nomination at the county convention.

The Channing correspondent ought to apply for a job with the associated press and go [sic] to Manchuria to handle war news, judging from his report relative to the ball game between Channing and Sagola. Every ball team is bound to get beat sometimes, but Sagola, or any other baseball aggregation, don't [sic] like to see a half-column write up explaining their defeat when the facts are they didn't play ball on the day mentioned. To explain how it was: Channing asked for a game for that day, but was informed by the manager at Sagola that, on account of the dance the base ball boys were giving on Saturday night, they would be unable to put up a good game. The next day, about 1:30 p.m., one man from Channing came down and asked for a game, and the manager told him that if he could pick up a team, he could have the grounds. So he got up a team of seven men, some of them of the Sagola team and some others, and filled it out with Channing players. (And with due credit, the two men from Channing, played brilliant ball, and tried hard to defeat their team mates.) But it was a demoralized team, no one playing in his position, consequently errors resulted, and defeat followed. Sagola defeated the best team Channing ever put on a ball field here by a score of 3 to 2, and I trust they can duplicate their victory if they ever play again with the local team. In conclusion, [I] will say, I think that the write up was not a product of any of the Channing ball boys, as they have always been gentlemen here, and probably was

from the pen of some enthusiastic fan who cherished victory no matter from what kind of a team. So please don't claim to be playing Sagola unless you are playing them, and then if victory should come to your town, you will get due credit from here.

C.L. Graff, of Blairsville, Penn., is visiting Louis Langon.

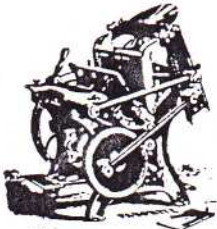
Louis Langon will have his saw-mill running by the first of next week.
