Smith of Greeley.

Springs Soldier Wounded in Africa

Colorado Springs, Aug. 27.—The war department Thursday notified Mrs. Paul O. Sams that her husband, a private first class, had been wounded in action in Africa, but that wasn't news to her.

Previously she had received a V-mail letter from him telling of his being wounded and being in a station hospital in Africa. He was "fine" and "receiving splendid care," his letter said.

Sams entered the service July 6, 1942, and was sent overseas last February, after training at Camp Roberts, Calif., and Fort Meade, Md.

TWO COLORADANS DECORATED FOR BRAVERY IN AIR

Capt. Fred Klatt and Sergt. McCalmont Win Medals In Pacific.

Two Colorado members of the Fifth air force in the southern Pacific have been awarded the Air Medal. Lieut. Gen. George C. Kenney announced in dispatches Friday from General MacArthur's headquarters in Australia.

They are Tech. Sergt. Howard V. McCalmont of Eckley and Capt. Fred W. Klatt Jr. of Durango.

A Tech. Sergt. Howard V. McCalmont, also of Eckley, was listed in dispatches Aug. 18, as killed in action. He was the son of Mrs. Bertha Campbell. It is presumed the medal was awarded posthumously.

Captain Klatt twice previously distinguished himself in aerial combat in the Pacific fighting. Last January he was cited for having operated a bomber on raids over New Guinea, and last February received press notices for having participated in 700 sorties against the Japs. More than 175 missions were completed by his organization without the loss of a single plane in the five months of attack in the Papua campaign.

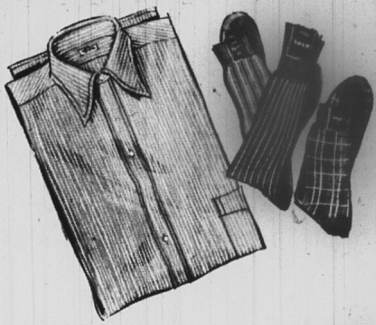
