DAR Hears Address On Lincoln

Program Honoring Great Emancipator at Spalding House—Convention Delegates

LOWELL—Abraham Lincoln symbolizes the true American and represents the opportunity that America offers to men to rise in the world according to their merits," stated James F. Conway, submaster of Lowell high school, in an inspiring patriotic address before Molly Varnum chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, meeting yesterday afternoon at the historic Spalding house.

The speaker continued, "Lincoln was a living example of what liberty and freedom mean to the American citizen. He uttered tremendous truths in the most noble and simple language. He was a brother to the down-trodden and obscure and had in his heart the charity of St. Paul. His high thoughts led him to have a profound belief in the destiny of the American people."

His topic was "The Universal Appeal of Abraham Lincoln to the People" and was the highlight of the patriotic meeting in honor of the birthday of the 16th president of the United States, being observed today.

Natalie Stansfield, Greater-Lowell Girl Scout Director, Addresses Rotarians

LOWELL—Directing the "atomic energy of youth" into the right channels can build a world just as surely as the atomic bomb can destroy a universe, Miss Natalie Stansfield, director of the Greater-Lowell Girl Scouts, told the Rotary club yesterday in which she appealed for the aid of the business leaders in the youth movement.

Miss Stansfield was the guest speaker at the weekly dinner meeting held in a downtown restaurant at noon. She was introduced by Edgar Kent, program chairman. After opening her talk with a brief discussion of the current interest in atomic energy and its possible effect on the future of the world, Miss Stansfield pointed out the vital need for a consideration of the problems that face the youth of the nation.

In asking for the backing of the adult population in the youth movement, the Girl Scout director stated that 200 adults are active members of the Greater-Lowell council and that they are responsible for the welfare of some 1300 girls between 7 and 17 years. With these children, she said, the adults are endeavoring to develop well-balanced individuals who will have hobbies and resources within themselves and will be an asset to any group.

Continuing, Miss Stansfield stated in part: "Money has been provided for special activities and recreational facilities; professional people have been employed to organize clubs, teams, groups, pro-

Celery Root Appetizer
Sautéed Veal Cutlet
Shoestring Potatoes
Cauliflower with Pimiento Sauce
Cole Slaw
Lemon Souffle

Celery Root Appetizer
Three celery roots, salt, pepper, onion juice, English mustard, mayonnaise, caviar, two hard cooked egg yolks, rice, four slices of marinated beet, shredded lettuce.

Boil the celery root until tender. Peel and mash. Season with salt, pepper, onion juice, English mustard and enough mayonnaise to form a paste. Shape into mounds. Make an indentation in the top of each mound and fill with caviar. Place mound on a slice of marinated beet and place on shredded lettuce. Make a border around the mound of cooked rice egg yolk.

Cauliflower with Pimiento Sauce
Two tablespoons flour, one-half teaspoon salt, freshly ground pepper, two tablespoons butter or margarine, one cup hot milk, four tablespoons pimiento (puree), one head cauliflower.

Cook cauliflower in boiling salted water until tender. Blend flour, salt and pepper with melted butter or margarine. Gradually pour on the milk. Cook until creamy, stirring constantly. Add pimiento puree (pimientos forced through a sieve). Drain cauliflower and place in serving dish. Pour pimiento sauce over cauliflower and serve.

Drop cookies which use very little sugar can be made with a moderate amount of molasses and grated raw sweet potato. Grated orange rind is also used in the same recipe.

To keep soft cookies from drying out, store them in a covered jar with a piece of apple or orange.
